## Pen-Del CoNAM 2023 Report to Annual Conference

Iwiinitu and greetings to our many Relatives throughout this part of Turtle Island.

We are grateful to have resumed meeting in person this last year with thanks to Grace UMC in Georgetown for their continued hospitality. It is good to be in one another's presence. To accommodate many different schedules, we meet one month in person from 10am-12noon and then alternate the following month with a 7pm Zoom meeting. Everyone is welcome any time! Our work of educating, supporting and advocating for Native American culture, concerns, challenges and contributions continues on many fronts. Here is a brief review of some of our efforts from the last year and looking ahead:

**The Great Tree of Peace at Pecometh** – a continued work of the 2016 Act of Repentance. This past year, CoNAM members and Pecometh staff discovered the Great Tree of Peace planted in 2017 had been eaten by deer. Pecometh now has plans underway to replace it with another Eastern White Pine while working with CoNAM members to create a picture board explaining the significance of the tree as a symbol of the Conference's commitment to the Act of Repentance along with some history and current roles of the First People in the area.

**Kutikikowakanum, Our Nanticoke Language** – The Nanticoke Language Project is coming to its fulfillment this year, after three long years and a three decade period of prayer, as we look toward the publishing of the first handbook with CD to help with audio learning of the rekindled language. **Missing and Murdered Indigenous Relatives** – Plans are underway with the Lenape people and Cheswold UMC to sponsor a Community Walk and Day of Remembrance to honor the many First People who have gone missing or murdered from their families with little to no law enforcement investigation or recognition. **Native American Boarding School** – Healing for Our Children; Justice for Our Communities Continued efforts at education and awareness of deep historical trauma resulting from the forced taking of Native children to Boarding Schools for over five generations. Methodism across the nation was actively engaged in supporting and managing these schools. It is past time for Truth-telling and accountability.
